Hello Nobels and Ladies,

As your Treasurer, I stand up at every stated meeting announcing our bank and investment balances. It's kind of boring, and not a very sexy topic, but you should be interested, as the numbers are a clear indicator of Moslem's performance and its future.

Without resources, there is no ongoing enterprise — not fraternal or philanthropic. It's no secret that we spend more money than we generate on an annual basis.

There is no need to be alarmed currently, as we are in strong financial shape. Most of you know it wasn't long ago that we sold parking lots downtown, which became the majority of our bank account.

Today, we have completed construction on our new facility, we have the bus garage, and we hold property in Novi as an investment, on top of our investments with Fifth Third Bank. Both the vacant property and new building are paid for. However, these acquisitions have greatly depleted our building fund.

Even though the buildings are paid for, we have ongoing expenses, not just the utilities to operate, but repairs, landscaping, snow removal and ongoing maintenance.

Nobels, I would like to humbly ask that you demand from the leadership, that a percentage of all income be set aside for the Building Fund use ONLY. It need not be a huge amount - even just 10% mandatory set aside, will help in the future when repairs are required.

Moslem was chartered in 1880, we have survived for 145 years! Today, we are the current steward of this fraternity, as such, it falls to us to see that future generations have a home too. What say you?

Moslem Shrine Has a Rich History

Fraternal greetings to all Moslem Shriners,

As the remodeling to Shrine Center is getting close to completion, I'm hoping to start displaying the many historical items are presently being stored in my office, in the IT Room, and tucked away at the Clawson building. Moslem Shriners have a very rich history.

In September, a blue Meijer's bag was dropped at my office which was full of past monthly issues of the Moslemite ranging from January 1983 through November 1985. Mixed in the among the Moslemites was a copy of the Clown Alley, a publication of the International Shrine Clown Association dated June/July 1983. I believe this issue was saved because of the photograph on the cover. This photograph is considered one of the most iconic photographs, not only in Moslem's history, but also in the history of Shriners International. The photograph was taken by Noble Donald Kincheloe. The photograph shows the State of Michigan historical plaque regarding the first site of the Shrine Circus in downtown Detroit. Also, in the photograph to the left of the plaque is a circus elephant standing up on its rear legs.

In the pile of magazines, I also discovered what I take to be a program dated September 13, 1959, from the first annual Charity Football Game between the Cleveland Browns and the Detroit Lions. Shriners Hospitals for Children was the charity to benefit from this game. The Lions won the game. The score was Browns 28, the Lions 33, in front of 33,435 fans. Noble Elmer A. Clark was Chairman of the All-Pro Football Shrine Charity Game. The game was televised across the nation. It was more than two years in the making. Illustrious Potentate Herbert E. Payne didn't believe it could be done, but with hard work and patience efforts it came to fruition. Also, I checked online, and copies of this program are going for \$250.00.

As I looked through the stack of Moslemites, I thought I would mention some of the highlights;

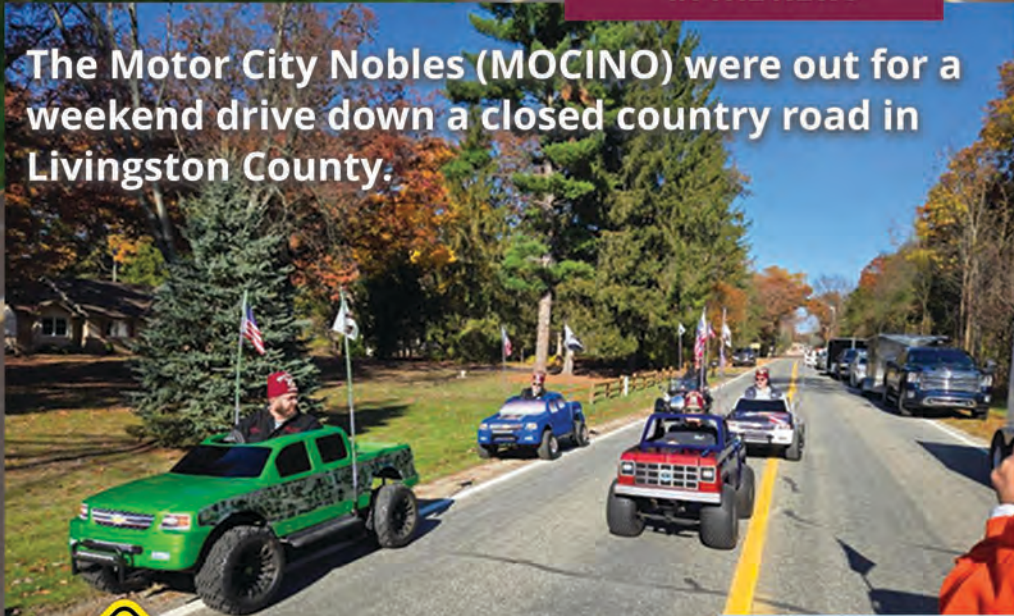
especially like the variety of vehicles. Many of the children are excited to see Fuzzy riding on the golf cart as our MOCINO mascot.

ERIE REPORT

Nobles...did you know?

That the property that Shriners Erie sits on, was a gift from the family of a local businessman? That's right, businessman with a big heart by the name of Pierre Simon Vincent Hamot. He was very active in the community and built up a homestead at the foot of State Street. After his death in 1846, his family donated the homestead and what was originally called "Hamot" has grown to the Erie we support today.

Shriners pay rent of \$1.00 per year for the property that the Shriners Erie campus sits on to Yale Medical School with the caveat that the property be used for medical purposes. As SC Erie continues to support the vision of the Shriners System, "more children in more places," SC Erie has moved to a clinical model, saving money on over night services for patients recovering from surgeries.

The rooms on the top floor of the building were converted to medical office space and leased to a large Ear, Nose and Throat practice, converting cost into income. We now have entered into conversations to also rent two Operating Rooms and corresponding space, to the same group. These purposeful actions have greatly reduced the financial burden on the Endowment, allowing more monies to be available for other endeavors like research and training for the next generation of pediatric orthopedic professionals.

In fact, the Erie campus is within \$1 million dollars of being self sufficient and receiving very little of the Endowment. Did you also know that about 25% of Erie's operating income comes from donations? That's right. Clubs, Units and individuals made a big difference in our Shriners Kids lives.

As a member of Child Care, I want to thank all of you for your hard volunteer work to support all the hospitals in our system.

Please keep up your kindness and donate to not only Erie Hospital, but all the hospitals in our Moslem jurisdiction. Year to date SC Erie has had the pleasure of 13,748 encounters with our Shriner Kids.

But wait... there's more! **Fraternal Fundraising Guidelines
An Excerpt from General Order No. 1:
FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES**

It is natural to associate the fez with Shriners Hospitals for Children. Because of this, meticulous attention must be given to all fundraising activities, including circuses, to make certain that such activities comply with the law of the land and that a contributor is not led to believe that his money will be used for the Hospitals when all or a portion thereof will be used otherwise. The integrity of our charity and of our fraternity must remain above reproach.

Your specific attention is called to the following fraternal and charitable bylaws:

- » **§335.3 Use of Name "Shriners Hospitals For Children."** The use of the name "Shriners Hospitals for Children" or reference to the Hospitals in connection with any fundraising activity by a temple or Noble without the written consent of the Imperial Potentate and the chairman of the board of trustees of the Hospitals is prohibited.
- » **§503.11 Commercial Use of Name.** The use of the name "Shriners Hospitals for Children" or reference to the hospitals in connection with any commercial product or business enterprise is prohibited unless the written consent of the boards of directors and trustees has been first obtained.

Now, therefore, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED:

1. Fundraising for Fraternal Purposes:

(a) No Noble (in his capacity as a Shriner), club, unit, organization of Nobles or affiliated or appendant corporations, shall engage in any fundraising activity without the express written consent of the potentate of the temple having jurisdiction thereof.

(b) There can be no representation, express or implied, that the proceeds will be for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children.

(c) The temple potentate shall carefully examine all phases of the advertising, promotion and solicitation to determine that it complies with §335.3 and §503.11 of the fraternal and charitable bylaws and that there is no representation, expressed or implied, that would lead a reasonably prudent person to believe that the proceeds will be for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children. If the potentate is in doubt, he must receive the opinion of the Imperial Potentate who, after consultation with the Director of Temple Accounting, shall make the final determination.

(d) The temple potentate must approve the terms and provisions of any contract for a fundraising activity after receiving the advice of the temple attorney, and, additionally, as may be required by the temple bylaws.

(e) A copy of the temple potentate's written consent shall be mailed to the Executive Vice President, Shriners International. Further, such written material pertaining to the fundraising activity, as requested by the Executive Vice President, Shriners International, shall be promptly mailed to him.

2. Fundraising for Charitable Purposes:

(a) No Noble (in his capacity as a Shriner), club, unit, organization of Nobles or affiliated or appendant corporations shall engage in any charitable fundraising activity other than for Shriners Hospitals for Children. Permission therefor must be first obtained in writing from the temple potentate. The temple potentate must then obtain written permission from the chairmen of the boards of directors and trustees. This request for written permission shall be sent to the Executive Vice President, Shriners International, P. O. Box 31356, Tampa, FL 33631-3356. No charitable fundraising activity shall be held in the jurisdiction of another temple without the written permission of the potentate of that temple.

(1) A joint charitable fundraising activity with another 501(c)(3) charity may be authorized, provided that a minimum of 50% of the net proceeds are for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children, and the chairmen of the boards of directors and trustees determine, on a case by case basis, that it is in the best interest of Shriners Hospitals for Children and they grant their written permission for the activity.

(2) A charitable fundraising activity conducted by a temple located outside of the U.S.A. may be authorized for other charities, provided that the chairmen of the boards of directors and trustees determine, on a case by case basis, that it is in the best interest of Shriners Hospitals for Children and they grant their written permission for the activity.

(b) All Shrine temples and their units, Shrine clubs, Shrine Associations and their units and Imperial Sessions of Shriners International are prohibited from engaging telemarketing firms and direct mail firms to assist with fundraising for Shriners Hospitals for Children. Any existing contracts may be completed, but not renewed. No new contracts are permitted without first obtaining written permission from the chairmen of the boards of directors and trustees.

(c) 100% of net proceeds (as defined in the Charitable Fundraising—Approval And Reporting provisions of this General Order) from charitable fundraising must be given to Shriners Hospitals for Children except for such portion thereof as may be permitted to be retained for the temple Shrine Hospital

Patient Transportation Fund, pursuant to the Special Purpose Funds provisions of any General Order. Provided, however, if the chairmen of the boards of directors and trustees determine for good cause shown, that the law of the land requires that a portion of the net proceeds must be distributed locally, then they may, if they determine it to be in the best interest of Shriners Hospitals for Children, grant their written permission for such distribution. The remaining net proceeds from charitable fundraising must be given to Shriners Hospitals for Children and may not be designated or restricted in any way other than for research at one or all of our hospitals.

(d) The temple shall report the result of each charitable fundraising activity within sixty days of the activity, pursuant to the Charitable Fundraising—Approval And Reporting provisions of any General Order.

(e) This section shall not apply to activities exempt under §335.4(b) of the bylaws of Shriners International.

(f) Each independent corporation or entity that receives the permission of the chairmen of the boards of directors and trustees to raise moneys for Shriners Hospitals for Children, and which does not have its financial statements reviewed pursuant to §§334.6 & 337.8 of the bylaws of Shriners International, shall have its financial statements audited by a certified, chartered or licensed public accountant and shall submit such audit report to Shriners International within 120 days of the activity.

3. Statement of Purpose and Disclosure:

(a) Every fundraising activity must contain factual information on its solicitation material, tickets, programs and documents, including all electronically transmitted material, regarding the use of the proceeds. Examples: "Proceeds are for the benefit of (_____ Shriners) (_____ Shrine club) activities." "Proceeds are for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children."

(b) Every fundraising activity which is not entirely for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children shall prominently state on all solicitation material, including tickets, programs, documents and electronically transmitted material, that "payments are not deductible as charitable contributions."

(c) There must be compliance with the Revenue Act of 1987 provision of any general order by U.S. temples.

4. Compliance with Applicable Laws:

It is the responsibility of the temple potentate, after receiving the advice of the temple attorney, to determine that there is compliance with all applicable laws in its jurisdiction for the temple's fundraising activities.

5. Financial Records:

(a) The temple shall maintain detailed financial records pertaining to all fundraising activities involving Nobles, clubs, units, organizations of Nobles and affiliated and appendant corporations. Details of all revenues and expenditures shall be maintained in such financial records.

(b) The temple must retain such detailed financial records for a period of seven (7) years.

(c) There must be compliance with Financial Reporting on Charitable Funds and Activities provision of any General Order.

6. Notification to Nobility:

A copy of the Fundraising Activities provisions of this General Order shall be printed in the temple publication at least once every calendar year. If there is no temple publication, then a copy shall be mailed to each Noble in the temple not later than the last day in March of each calendar year.

7. Prior Permission:

Every Noble (in his capacity as a Shriner), club, unit, temple, organization of Nobles or affiliated or appendant corporations is prohibited from entering into any telemarketing agreement or contract to raise money for the benefit of Shriners Hospitals for Children without first obtaining written permission from the chairmen of the boards of directors and trustees. This request for written permission shall be sent to the Executive Vice President, Shriners International, P. O. Box 31356, Tampa, Florida 33631-3356.

8. Discipline:

Any officer, Noble or temple which violates a provision of Fundraising Activities is subject to discipline pursuant to the bylaws of Shriners International.

9. Shriners International Education Foundation:

Notwithstanding the previous provisions of Fundraising Activities stated above, Nobles may contribute, encourage other Nobles to contribute and engage in charitable fundraising activities directly to Nobles and their families for the benefit of the Shriners International Education Foundation.

A New Haven for Families: The Inauguration of Dayton's Ronald McDonald House

DAYTON, OHIO – On July 22, 2025, the Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) of Dayton unveiled its transformative new facility, strategically located in front of Shriners Children's Ohio. This state-of-the-art home-away-from-home triples the capacity of its predecessor, offering critical support to families of children receiving medical care. The ribbon-cutting ceremony celebrated not just a building, but a profound commitment to easing the burdens of pediatric illness through community and compassion.

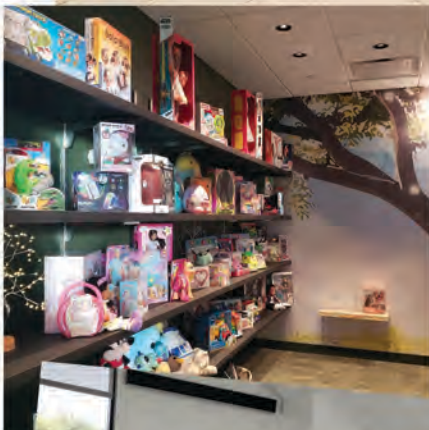
The Ronald McDonald House serves an essential purpose: providing a comforting, cost-free refuge for families whose children are undergoing treatment at nearby hospitals. These houses offer private sleeping rooms, communal kitchens, play areas, and laundry facilities, creating a "home away from home" where parents can focus on their child's recovery without logistical or financial stress. Meals, often donated by local supporters, and on-site staff provide emotional and practical support, fostering a sense of community during challenging times. Since 1974, RMHC has served millions globally, embodying a mission of care through partnerships like the one with Shriners.

The new Dayton facility is a testament to this mission on a grand scale. With 42 private guest rooms—up from the original 14—it features en-suite bathrooms, comfortable bedding, and space for siblings. Amenities include a spacious family kitchen, a teen lounge, outdoor play areas, and quiet meditation rooms, all designed with accessibility in mind, including wide hallways and adaptive features for children with





mobility challenges. Positioned steps from Shriners Children's Ohio, a leader in pediatric orthopedic and burn care, the house ensures families are moments from their child's bedside, strengthening the vital collaboration between RMHC Dayton and Shriners.



The inauguration brought together heroes of all kinds. Dr. Stewart from Shriners Children's Tampa joined representatives from the Tampa Shriners chapter and the Dayton hospital board for the ribbon-cutting. The Tampa chapter's landmark \$3 million donation toward the facility's construction underscored the Shriners' shared mission. "This gift honors our commitment to healing children, one family at a time," Dr. Stewart said. Hospital board members echoed this, noting, "With 42 rooms, we're building resilience, not just walls." Over 200 attendees, including staff, donors, and families, celebrated the milestone, with children playing in the new courtyard—a poignant reminder of the mission's heart.





The momentum continued with a second major fundraiser for Shriners Children's Ohio: a Detroit Tigers game on August 18, 2025, which drew an enthusiastic crowd. The event was a successful project, based on ticket sales for our charities through a percentage of ticket sales. The event's success has sparked hope that it will become an annual tradition, joining other record-breaking



fundraisers. These efforts underscore the tireless dedication of the Shriners and their supporters. To all groups fueling these initiatives, your hard work is reigniting our mission. Thank you, Sue and Tim Lancaster, and everyone who helped.





Adding to this wave of support, the annual golf fundraiser, hosted by WB Troy Thompson and his lovely wife, Kristen, saw an incredible turnout this year. Their dedicated time and efforts transformed the event into an epic celebration of generosity, raising historical amounts for our hospitals.
